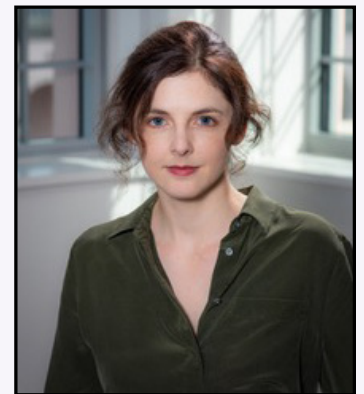

Sarasota's Sixty-Six Years of Japanese Prints

Rhiannon Paget, Ph.D.

Curator of Asian Art, John & Mable Ringling Museum of Art

Since its founding, Sarasota has attracted artists, designers, and writers, becoming a regional center for culture. At the forefront of mid-century art and design, the city was also one of the earliest places in North America for the second wave of Japonisme to break in the 1950s and 60s. From 1953, a series of well-attended exhibitions drawn from the collection of local statesman Karl Bickel made Sarasota an early locus for modern Japanese prints in the U.S. Bickel later donated many of these objects to the John & Mable Ringling Museum of Art, launching what has since become one of the richest areas for the Museum's Asian art holdings. A selection of the collection is currently on view in the exhibition *Woodblock Prints from Postwar Japan*.



Rhiannon Paget, Ph.D

Rhiannon Paget is the curator of Asian Art at the John & Mable Ringling Museum of Art in Sarasota. She received her doctorate from the University of Sydney, Australia, and has published research on Japanese prints, paintings, textiles, and popular visual culture. Her exhibition, Woodblock Prints from Postwar Japan, is currently on view in the Ting Tsung and Wei Fong Chao Center for Asian Art at The Ringling.

As you know, as part of the Fine Arts' 50th celebration, we are going to sponsor "*The Price of Everything*" at the Sarasota Film Festival. It is scheduled for Sunday, April 7 at 4 pm at the Memorial Auditorium.

All members will receive a free pass and we encourage you to bring friends and family to attend and view this exciting film. A panel discussion by local arts experts will follow. Additional tickets can be purchased through the Film Festival box office.

- Our educational events and salons are wrapping up for the season. All are fully subscribed.
- The scholarship committee is making final decisions about our scholars for this year.
- The program committee is planning some events for the summer—workshops, luncheons, and other possible gatherings. So many of our members are now year-round residents—stay tuned for more details!

Artists Among Us



Marjorie Sayer

Marjorie Sayer's goal is to explore ways to experiment with the figure and landscape in different spatial relationships. She wants the figure to exist and be recognizable but gradually become more abstract by bold strokes of color and gesture. The finished paintings are a result of numerous layers of paint creating a sense of tension between areas of lightness and heaviness, having human forms that seem to

emerge, then disappear. "I love the expressive tactile quality that I arrive at by using Impasto oil paint applied with a palette knife." "The creation of the painting is rapid, and the result is texture and exhilaration," she says. Her response to both the figure and to landscape is immediate. It is visceral. Charcoal highlights the gesture in mark making. She says that landscapes are another matter; they embrace the ground, sky, barns and are joyful and rich with color.



Marjorie received her BFA from Cornell University, with a semester abroad at the University of Florence, Italy. She studied for her Masters' degree in History of Art at NYU and the University of Munich, Germany; she painted at Arts Student League in NYC.

PRESIDENT'S ADVISORY BOARD

The first meeting of The Fine Arts President's Advisory Board was held on Friday, March 15. Participating in the luncheon discussion were President Elect, Donna Maytham, Katherine Martucci, Tonya Eubank and Jerry Chesley. Members from the community were Leslie Butterfield, Public Art; Miriam Wallace, New College; Kristina Keogh, Ringling College; Andrea Knies, Arts and Cultural Alliance; Michael Marraccini, Sarasota Contemporary Dance Board; and Marjorie Floyd of Strategic Marketing.

The plan is for this Advisory Board to meet twice annually and discuss how the Fine Arts Society is perceived in the community, get feedback from outside the membership, and raise awareness of our Society and its contribution to the arts. If you would like to make suggestions about additional Advisory Board members, please let me know.

REDESIGNING THE FINE ARTS BOARD

Over the past several years, Fine Arts has continually added new positions to the Board of Directors. For example, Transition,

Foundation Relations, The Giving Challenge, Strategic Planning, and the Anniversary and Governance are all relatively new.

While each of these functions is important, the end result is a Board of over twenty Committee Chairs and Co-Chairs all responsible to the President. This is too many "Chairs" for a president to comfortably manage. So, the goal is to redesign the Board in a way that responsibility is more evenly distributed among Board members and the President's work load is kept within reason.

MEMBERSHIP

Of prime importance is finding creative ways to gain new members. At the Film Festival in April, the Fine Arts Society will distribute a "one time only" special Membership Application Form to those attending showings of "The Price Of Everything." We need volunteers at the showings to distribute informational brochures, highlight the new membership forms, and spread the word about the Fine Arts Society. Please email me if you can volunteer.

Our goal is to reach 200 total members by May of next year. With the addition of new members, the Fine Arts Society will be able to undertake exciting projects that are supported by enthusiastic volunteers.

To meet this goal, a thorough review of Fine Arts' membership policies and procedures will begin this summer. Our policies need to be measured against how similar organizations attract and retain their members. If changes are indicated, we will propose necessary modifications that help us adapt to the changing environment.

COMMUNICATION

When our wonderful Kathy Elias resigned, we lost the ability to maintain the Fine Arts' Facebook page. As of April, we will be back on Facebook and communicating with our 700 "Friends" who have been patiently waiting for our return. Instagram may be in our future as well. Stay tuned!

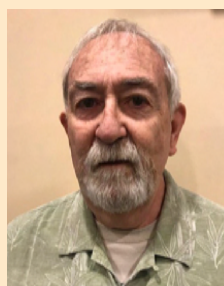

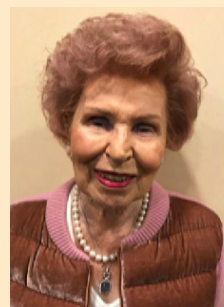
