# The New Sarasota Performing Arts Center

#### Your Questions Answered!

Are differing reports causing you to wonder what exactly is planned for Sarasota's Bayfront Park?

For many months there has been a great deal of information in the media about the Van Wezel, the new Sarasota Orchestra music center and the new Sarasota Performing Arts Center on the bayfront. Some reports are inconsistent and lead to thoughtful questions. The Sarasota Performing Arts Center Foundation wants to clear the confusion, share initial plans, and explain what lies ahead. Members of their staff will be with Arts Advocates on November 16th to discuss all the details!

The City of Sarasota is exploring how to preserve and repurpose the Van Wezel, which is not to compete with the new facility. The Sarasota Performing Arts Foundation's mission is to "create and sustain a vibrant performing arts campus, advance education and enrich communities through the power of the arts." Previously known as the Van Wezel Foundation, it has partnered with the Hall since 1987 to serve the community, including more than 35,000 students and their families. The Foundation is leading the effort to build a new Sarasota Performing Arts Center, a public-private partnership with the city, in collaboration with the Bay Park Conservancy AND the Van Wezel Performing Arts Hall.



Our speakers are Kelli Maldonado of the Sarasota Performing Arts Foundation and Cortez Crosby, a consultant from the Paratus Group which is working with the Foundation.



#### DIANA DE AVII A

Diana de Avila was training to become a combat military police officer in the U.S. Army when she suffered a traumatic brain injury in a motorcycle accident. Years later, her gift for fractal art emerged following a relapse of her existing multiple sclerosis. She has a rare condition known as Acquired Savant Syndrome, in which a person suddenly exhibits a remarkable talent.

Despite a lack of formal training, Diana has created over 2000 digital art pieces rooted in fractal geometry, drawing inspiration from the convergence of quantum physics, chaos theory, and divine order.

She found her artistic community within the movement known as "Techspressionism." Here, she continuously pushes the boundaries of her digital art and explores innovative methods of creation. Diana is a Signature member of the National Association of Women Artists (NAWA) and a member of the American League of American Pen Women (NLAPW). She is also a part of the Sarasota artist collective called SArtQ.

Diana is the subject and co-author of the award-winning book, Soldier, Sister, Savant, in which she shares her artistic journey. Diana and her co-author Wilma Davidson recently secured a publishing contract for their children's book set to be released next summer.

#### **JESSICA HARTMAN**

Jessica Hartman's dream of being a student at Ringling College has finally come true. Jessica's previous arts education came primarily from her high school classes at Alexander W. Dreyfoos School of the Arts in West Palm Beach. Her plan to go from there to Ringling had to be set aside due to a family emergency. Instead, she attended community college and then enlisted in the US Navy where she spent nine years as an air traffic controller.

In addition to her studies, Jessica's life today includes three children and a husband who was a fellow Navy air traffic controller. Her goal is to work for a major animation company upon graduation.

#### **JOHN QUIGLEY**

John Quigley joined the Army after 9/11, where he served in the infantry with multiple combat deployments working with Special Operations and Marine Regimental Combat Teams. After deployment, he worked as a combatives and small arms instructor. Once discharged, John transitioned to private military contracting where he performed security for government officials, high ranking military officers, and diplomats from around the world. Art has always been part of his life, but he never considered it as a career path until he was unable to return to military contracting due to an injury.

John is in his third year at Ringling College of Art & Design as an Illustration major with an emphasis on Visual Development. He uses mixed media techniques to bring together his love of photography, painting, and the thrill of finding new ways to use overlooked materials.

Upon graduation, he hopes to have a career in storyboarding and concept design for a major studio.

#### MARK WISEMAN

Mark Wiseman, a Sarasota native, is enrolled in the Graphic Design program at Ringling College of Art and Design. Mark's art style is a blend of graffiti and calligraphy known as calligraffiti. Calligraffiti is a worldwide phenomenon that began appearing in streets and has increasingly migrated into galleries around the planet. It's a visual language that has roots in ancient and contemporary alphabet forms that range from Arabic to the Latino fonts found on the walls of East Los Angeles.





He served eight years in the Marine Corps and did three

overseas tours, where he was exposed to street and business signs written in Arabic and classical languages like Sanskrit. "It looked like brushstrokes," he says, "and because I couldn't read it, it was abstract art for me." After serving in the military, Wiseman experienced post-traumatic stress disorder. He found a way out through art therapy. "I cannot sit and paint," he says. "I like to flow, use my body—like a dance with the wall."

Mark has participated in the PINC festival in the Rosemary district and recently the Paint Memphis festival. His latest show was at Art Ovation Hotel. He hopes to own his own sign shop and bring more murals to the local area.

## Art Talk: Honoring our veteran artists

#### PURSUING DREAMS AFTER A MILITARY CAREER

#### NOVEMBER 10 | 4-6 PM

We are privileged to honor Arts Advocates members and US military veterans Jennifer Hartman, John Quigley and Mark Wiseman. All three are now pursuing careers in art.

John Quigley has been creating art for as long as he can remember. He is currently a third year student at Ringling with a major in illustration. Quigley said he always wanted to be a professional artist, "But I didn't know how to get there. My time in the Army gave me the confidence and financial backing to help me make my way to Ringling." John is open to whatever the future holds, whether it be working as a concept artist for military or CIA projects, designing haunted houses at Universal Studios or owning an art gallery.

Mark Wiseman was an outdoorsy kid who was also drawn to art. "I went to a private art class," Mark said, "But I wanted to be outside. I wanted to get hurt, break bones and get dirty." Mark served in the Marines for eight years in places like Afghanistan, where he saw signs written in Arabic and Sanskrit. While he knew the writing was language, to him it looked like abstract art. Mark enrolled at Ringling after he left the military but realized he was more interested in getting real world experience. Today he creates calligraffiti, a style that is a mix of graffiti and calligraphy. He creates works under the name Fndmentls.



# DECEMBER GALLERY ARTIST CECILE MORAN

Cecile Moran's art education earned her Bachelor of Fine Arts and Master of Arts degrees. She then taught and studied in Madrid for three years. The rich experience of living in Spain and travelling in Europe, especially seeing the colorful work of Gauguin and the Expressionists, inspired her own art.

Upon returning to the states, Cecile found inspiration in the vibrancy of Mexican art. Her painting began to reflect a strong use of color. She also developed a painting technique inspired by the traditional textile art of the San Blas Indians of Panama. In addition, her art is often imbued with the use of gold leaf, a process that she learned from her father.


## **BOOK CLUB**

Our October Book Club discussion was hosted by Carole Schwartz, who presented a PowerPoint highlighting the dual timeline of The Night Portrait: A Novel of World War II and DaVinci's Italy by Laura Morelli. Discussion centered around several themes of the book:

- DaVinci's portrait of Lady with an Ermine and its effect on two powerful men;
- the role of the Monuments Men in saving art during WWII;
- the prejudice encountered by the two main female characters in both the 15th and 20th Centuries and how each responded; and
- the human cost to rescue art stolen by the Nazis.

All agreed it was an excellent, thought-provoking book.





Our next Book Club will be January 9, 2024, at 1:30pm in the Arts Advocates Gallery. The book is Bluebeard, the Autobiography of Rabo Karabekian by Kurt Vonnegut. It is a novel told as a first-person narrative and describes the late years of fictional abstract expressionist painter Rabo Karabekian, loosely based on Syd Solomon.
